What are Lendlease Foundation Community Grants?

Lendlease Foundation Community Grants Program, is an initiative to aid not-for profit community organisations and charities. Organisations that wish to apply must address a community need in one or more of the following Lendlease Sustainability Framework focus areas:



How does it work?

Lendlease Foundation partners with Bendigo Bank's Community Enterprise Foundation™ to administer the community grants program. Lendlease Foundation will provide total funding of \$100,000 to be awarded to ten community organisations.

What is the process?

Applications are lodged online through the Community Enterprise Foundation™ website. The following provides an outline of the process.

- Applications open Lendlease Employees are asked to contact community groups which meet the eligibility requirements (see below) and encourage them to apply.
- Applications are reviewed by the Community Enterprise Foundation™ (CEF) and the Lendlease Foundation Community Grants Advisory Committee to select the a shortlist of applications.
- Lendlease employees will have the opportunity to vote for the top ten community projects as part of the selection process.







- Final grant recipients are announced, and each community group completes the final paper work.
- Projects must be delivered within 12 months following a successful application.
- Acquittal Successful applicants are required to provide a report to the CEF on the project including a financial accounting of how the funds have been spent.

What community organisations are eligible for a Community Grant?

A community organisation is an entity that exists for public benefit and whose primary objective is something other than the generation of profit. Examples of community organisations include charities, not-for-profits, community groups or social enterprises which have a Not for Profit structure. Applicants are required to have a valid ABN and be able to produce financial statements. If they do not have an ABN they will be required to work with a project partner. See further information below.

What is the maximum amount of each Community Grant? How many Community Grants will be awarded?

There will be ten Community Grants awarded at the value of \$10,000 each.

How does Lendlease Foundation select which Community Organisations will receive funding? There are three steps in the selection process.

- 1. Applications will be reviewed for eligibility by the CEF.
- 2. Applications that meet the initial criteria will then be reviewed by the Lendlease Foundation Advisory Committee, consisting of Lendlease Foundation employees and other key Lendlease business stakeholders to create a short list. The selection criteria includes, but are not limited, to:
 - The organisation addresses a community need in one or more of the following Lendlease Sustainability Framework focus areas:
 - Resources and Materials
 - Climate Action
 - Nature and Pollution
 - Economic Prosperity
 - Community Inclusion
 - Wellbeing

(See Appendix A for examples)

- Level to which the grant will be used for community programs/activities, rather than 'one-off' purchases of equipment/items.
- What difference the grant will make to the organisation and the people/community it supports, with emphasis on the broad reach and longevity of the programs.
- 3. Shortlisted applications will then be listed for Lendlease employees to vote for the top projects.

The outcome of the selection process listed above will identify the top 10 applications who will be awarded \$10,000 each.

What types of projects can't be funded?

A Lendlease Community Grant will not support projects, clubs and/or groups that:

- Engage in illegal activities
- Have private benefits for members
- Apply to fund ongoing operating costs, ongoing wages or other organisational expenses
- Directly promote a particular religious or spiritual philosophy. Support to faith-based groups must be focus on welfare and community service activities that are not of a religious nature.
- Undertake projects or initiatives that are dangerous or discriminatory in any way.
- Apply to fund activities that are only sporting, social or recreational see below for detail
- Are government projects or entities see below for detail.
- Are for political purposes.
- Apply to fund retrospective requests to repay costs already incurred.







Sporting, Social and Recreational Activities

While sport in general is listed as not meeting charitable requirements, there are many instances where sport can be deemed eligible. Whilst equipment or facilities that can only be used for sport sake are not charitable, the other aspects of a sports club – like multipurpose pavilions / rooms / storage sheds that are also used by other, non-sporting groups in the community are often considered to deliver charitable benefits to the community. If you are applying for projects such as these, you may be asked to provide letters of support from two non-sporting groups stating how the project will be of benefit to them.

Sports groups can apply for funding to support projects that go beyond the sport itself. Sport can connect people in the community - where it delivers social outcomes or helps to interconnect those who may be otherwise socially isolated, sporting activity can be considered charitable.

For example, if the sporting project is to run a program for the disadvantaged, disabled or cultural minorities it is likely to be considered charitable and eligible for funding. Funding for equipment for these groups is also charitable.

Government and Schools

Charity Law in Australia clearly outlines that charitable money cannot be used to fund projects or programs that are the government's responsibility. Charities should not have to make up the shortfall of what is government's policy delivery. To ensure against this, the law prevents charitable grant-makers from paying entities with a government ABN.

Community groups like recreation reserves and community hall committees may operate under government ABN's. On their own these entities are not eligible for charitable funding however they can apply using a project partner. This also applies to public schools whom operate under a government ABN.

Project Partners

A project partner is an organisation who is eligible to receive charitable funding and is also willing to work with the group to deliver their project.

A project partner is one who can:

- · Receive the funds, and
- Help to deliver the project (through labour or expertise or other forms of support)

The partner should be able to confirm that they:

- Support the project, and
- · Are willing to receive the funds and commit to pass them on to complete the project, and
- Will help in some way to deliver the project beyond simply passing on the funds.

For public schools their P&C / P&F Association would be the applicant as they generally operate an ABN separate to the school (this applies to most states except Victoria).







To be considered, each application must include the following supporting documentation:

1. Financials

- Current signed Audited Financial Statements for the Applicant Organisation and Project Partner (where applicable).
- If your organisation is not required to audit your financials, please provide a profit and loss statement as a minimum and a balance sheet if available. Please also include a current bank statement.

2. Quotes

- Quotes are required for all budget items
- If you have conducted this project/program before, copies of receipts / invoices that substantiate this request from previous expenditure may be acceptable together with a detailed budget

3. Project Budget

Please ensure that your budget and/or supporting documentation clearly shows how the funds requested will be spent. Do not forget to include your contribution to the project and any in-kind support.

What will be required of me if my grant is successful?

You will be required to deliver on your application within 12 months of the application being deemed successful and receiving payment. You will then complete the CEF's acquittal process. You will also be required to provide photographs and a brief summary about your project and its outcomes. These images will be used to promote the Lendlease Community Grants in the following year. You may be contacted by a Social Return on Investment consultant to give feedback on how the grant has assisted your organisation and/or participants.

How do I apply?

To apply:

- Read all the information we have provided you in this pack
- Use the ONLINE APPLICATION FORM (available from 7 March 2022) to submit your application

Once your application has been submitted successfully, you will receive a confirmation email. Applicants will generally be advised of the outcome of their application within 8 – 12 weeks from the closing date.

Groups may not submit more than one application at a time.

FAQ's

I am doing a fundraising event: can Lendlease Foundation sponsor me?

Lendlease Foundation is unable to offer sponsorship donations.

Does Lendlease Foundation provide grants towards team sports trips or buying uniforms?

Community Grants will not be awarded to fund sports trips or buying uniforms, as there tends to be a limited number of people who benefit and a limited life span on the investment. Please consider how else the funds could support your community organisation, for example utilising the Grant for activities that focus on developing community programs/activities and align to the Lendlease Sustainability Framework.
